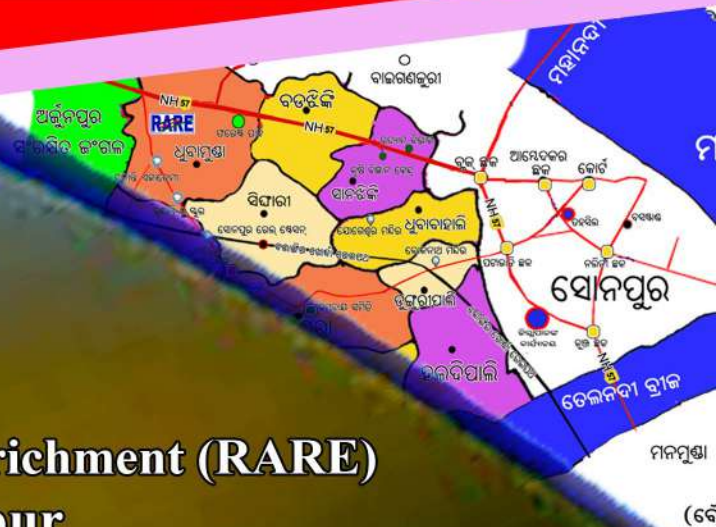


The Annual Report 2022-2023

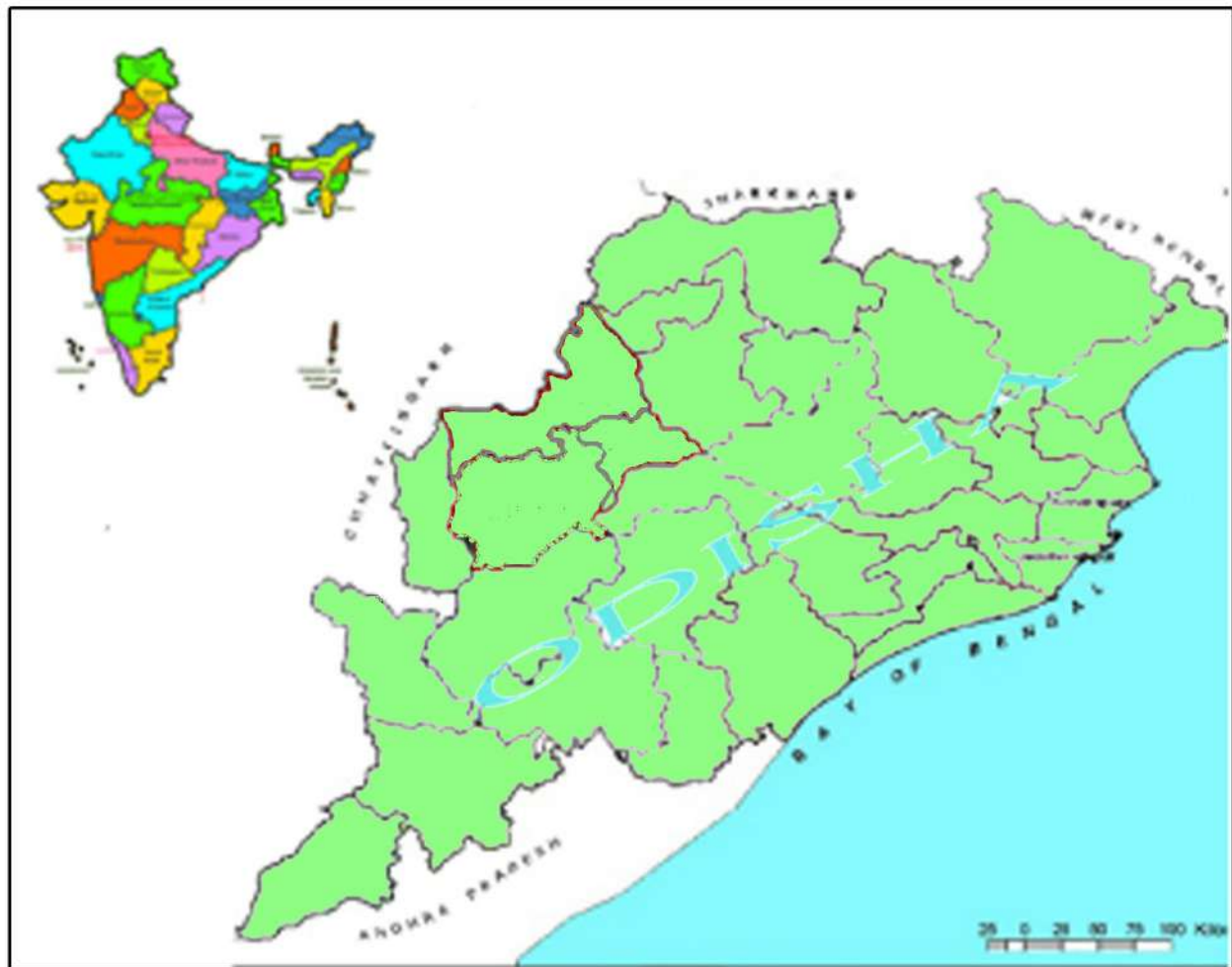

Target Population:

Our focused target groups are People with Disabilities and their Parents, Children, Senior Citizens, released Bonded Labour, Migrants, Returnee Migrants, Potential Migrants, Persons with Mental illness and their Caretakers, farmers, aggrieved consumers at micro level and we focused on service providers, institutions, civil society organizations, duty bearers, Networks, Federations, Media Persons at macro level in our different interventions and programmes.

Alternative Forms of Care and Support Programme for Children without Parental Care and Other Vulnerable Children

The “Alternative forms of Care and support programme for children without parental care and other vulnerable children” has launched in the month of May 2013 with the support from the StichtingKindpostzegels Nederland. The programme is directly working with children living without adequate parental Care and other vulnerable children at the Grampanchayat with an approach ensure that children in need of care and protection have opportunities and access to services that help them to exercise their rights to survival, development, protection and participation as well as full participation in a family-based care and community. At present the programme is continuing as “Child centered family focus programme” with community based approach. Currently the programme is being implemented intensively in Nine Grampanchayats namely Rengali, Chhakormal, Lachhipur, Khaliapali, Mayurudan and Mallikmunda under Sonepur Block of Subarnapur District and Gudvela, Deulgudi and Ghuna Gram Panchayat under Gudvela Block of Bolangir District in the State of Odisha. In the year 2022-2023, RARE is directly working with 120 vulnerable families and their children in need of care & protection especially children without parental care, orphan and other vulnerable children. The programme has worked to improve the socio-economic status of the supported families and children with regard to care and protection at family, institution (AWC/School) and community engaging the community actively in the entire process of the programme. It is one of the key values of the programme which we are practicing that not to refer the directly target children and their families as the receivers of service rather consider and actively involve them as the partners of the programme.

Result achieved during the Period June, 2022 to March, 2023 under the programme:

- Provided basic support and care services to 219 children i.e. 109 boys and 110 girls from 120 families
- 120 families linked with poverty alleviation and social security programme of Govt.
- 37 Caregivers supported for Income generation activities with financial assistance during project period
- 3 Follow up Training organized for caregivers on Skilful parenting & different Govt. Schemes and Programme where the caregiver could able to realize their responsibilities and link their family in suitable programme.

- 53 families have provided vegetable seeds like; radish, coriander and green leaf (Koshala, palak). Provided handholding support to prepare the income generation plan for each caregiver.
- Caregivers training on skilful parenting for 143 families (Old & New) have been conducted in 3 units at Sonapur Block of Subarnapur District and 1 Unit of Gudvela Block of Bolangir Dist. The caregivers acquired knowledge on parenting skills and resulted in building parent-children relationship, participation of children in household activities, positive behavioral changes in family towards children, giving adequate importance & attention to children in families, regular interaction with children in the families,
- 3 Number of Training implementing in project area 132 Care givers participated. The caregiver shared their issue of child marriage and child sexual abuse. 132 care givers aware on type of child sexual abuse and they pledge to aware their neighborhood and say Yes to school- no to child marriage.
- 179 members attended the PLCPC programme in 3 phases
- Role and responsibilities protection from Child Sexual Abuse (CSA). The Component on CSA has decided to put in the agenda of PLCPC. 100% PLCPC are functioning. PLCPC is regularly organizing A Day For Children program on Quarterly basis.
- Due to the Strengthening meeting with 30 Child and adolescent club they are able to raise their voice at family, education institution as well as able to maintain the activities of daily living.
- All the children produced before the CWC by online and off line mode to provide need based support as well as probable rehabilitation.
- Training to children club leader on Protection of Child Sexual Abuse
- 125 Adolescent in 2 Consultation with Adolescents club members on Child Marriage and its impact has been completed in Sonapur and Gudvela Blocks. All the adolescent members child marriage.
- Due to the training to adolescent on life skill education and career planning 20 Nos. of adolescent in different skill sector I.e. 13 Tailoring, 2 beauty parlor, 2 in Mahila Mitra and 3 adolescent continuing training at ITI on welder.
- Due to Campaigning against child marriage in operation block 4 child marriage instances received and step taken and stopped the marriage.
- Due to training to 135 adolescent on Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights, the Menstrual Hygiene, Proper use of Sanitary Napkins, Appropriate health Care, aware about the Govt. facilities on SRHR has developed in the area.
- Consultation with 154 ICDS Workers, ANM and ASHAs has created a positive impact to discussion on the ill impact of child marriage and how it is leading to child sexual abuse and connected to POCSO
- 52 teachers trained on Child Safeguarding and prevention of child marriage
- Consultation with 108 numbers of Newly elected Panchyati Raj Institution members has supported a lot to check child marriage and child sexual abuse also linkages the vulnerable family government scheme and programme.
- 2 Children festival including 590 children to hear the voice of children on Occasion of Children Day has provided a platform for interaction as well as show case the inherent quality of children.

CHILDLINE 1098

CHILDLINE 1098 a 24 x 7 hour service of Ministry of Women and Child Development. CHILDLINE India Foundation is a non-government organization. CHILDLINE works for the protection of rights of all children aged below 18 years

CHILDLINE Started in Subarnapur District from 31st August 2020. So far CHILDLINE cover all 6 blocks in Saharanpur with special focus of outreach and awareness.

The details of Activities undertaken by CHILDLINE and its progress are as follows;

Outreach and Awareness

CHILDLINE Subarnapur Conducted Outreach and Awareness program in all the 6 blocks of Subarnapur District. Through different programme it has reached up to 14533 children and 6057 adults in the district through one to one and group interactions. Apart from regular outreach programs 9 painting and rallies and formed 7 nos. of Child club in all blocks and conducted 42 nos. of meeting with children clubs.

Open house programme

CHILDLINE team Conducted 7 Open house programme on in different area of the district and able to gather the following issues which was affecting children.

- Access to drinking water and problems in schools in their community.
- Access to Anganwadi in their community.
- Access to toilet and drinking water facility at schools.
- Access to boundry wall at schools.

These issues were raised before local administration, including DEO, CDPO and Collector to resolve the issue and 50% issues have been resolved.

Special day celebration

The CHILDLINE team celebrates every special occasion, such as world Autism day world Health Day, world Environ day, World Day Against Child Labour, International Yaga day, world population day, world nature conservation day, Independence day world breast feeding week, Har Ghar Triranga, Teachers day, International Sign Language Day, Diwali Celebration, International Girl Child Day, Ganjayanti at Ghodadhar, Childrens day, Republic Day, National Girl Child day, International Mother Language Day and International Women day at different villages and institution of the district.

Programme at District level to village level:

In collaboration with different department, Organization and Institution CHILDLINE has organized programme like consultation on Prohibition of Child Marriage, child labour, street children, child beggar, early pregnancy, re-enrollment at School, inclusion in vocational skill building training etc. A day for Children is a best platform initiated by State Government to discuss and resolve the issues of children from Gram Panchayat level to District level. CHILDLINE ensures its participation and presentation for the protection of children of the district.

Case Interventions:

In this reporting period 215 cases intervened out of that 2 cases related to Children facing medical issues, 108 cases related to linkages and Sponsorship, 3 missing Child Case, 5 case involving Child sexual abuse, 4 cases of Corporal punishment, 17 cases of rehabilitation under CCI, 12 Child was restored with her family, 25 Children were given with Nutrition kits and 4 child was re-enrolled. 1 case of de-addiction counseling, 23 Child marriage cases, 14 cases of child labor, 3 forced Beggary and 4 cases of Child trafficking.

CHILDLINE Se Dosti Programme

CHILDLINE Subaranapur organized CHILDLINE SE DOSTI WEEK from 14.11.22 to 20.11.22. The objective of the programme was to aware the children about their rights with full Fun and Joyful environment. Under this programme so many creative activities like; rally, drawing, painting, awareness by campaign VAN and one act play was organized.

Psycho Social Support Activities:

The purpose of the Psycho social activities is to provide relaxation to children, adolescent, parents, caregivers, support persons through creative activities and sharing. The tool is also designed to help children against stress, fear and anxiety. The activities are designed for two different age cohorts: 6 to 10, and 11 to 19. CHILDLINE reached about 650 children from 45 villages in 6 blocks, during which, we conducted several innovative activities, that includes "Drawing your covid heroes", "sharing of Daily diary", "telling about your buddy", Gratitude Coloring etc.

Conclusion:

CHILDLINE 1098 is a dedicated helpline for the protection of children at round o Clock. Each and everyone should cooperate the team of CHILDLINE to protect children from each corner of India.

Apart from this a driver is engaged for transportation and the General Secretary-cum-CEO of the Organization is the Monitoring in Charge of the Centre.

Observation/Celebration of different days:

At the Disha-cum-Vikaas Centre different days are being celebrated like; Birth of each children, Rakshya Bandhan, Independence Day, Ganesh Pooja, International Girl Child Day, World Cerebral Palsy Day, World Autism Day, Diwali Festival, Children Day, International Day for Persons with Disabilities, New year Celebration, Holi, Republic Day, Mental Retardation Day, World Down Syndrome Day and Saraswati Pooja. All the programme observed to create awareness among the parents and public as well as internalize the value of the day. The target group of the centre are closely involved in the programme with cultural activities. In each programme Guest are being invited from official and social sector to encourage and interact with parents.

Besides this the staff members are also helping the administration during the special programme like; Bhima Bhoi Samarthya Sibira, training, meeting, survey, District level Exhibition and observation of different day.



SWABALAMBAN-DAY CARE THERAPY CENTER

Person with some different type of disability like Intellectual Disability, Cerebral Palsy, Autism and Multiple disabilities are neglected more due the lack of knowledge regarding these types of disability and specific rehabilitative measures and extent of the same needed for these people. Again, the problem is worse for such people living in rural and backward area where the special service for them is not available. Hence to cater the need of these categories of disable we are implementing a Project entitled “Swabalamban-Day Care Therapy Centre” for the children with Autism, Intellectual Disability, Cerebral Palsy and Multiple Disabilities with the financial support from Ministry of Social Security and Empowerment for PWDs Govt. of Odisha, with all required aids, appliances and qualified experts in the concern field.

The objective of the centre is to provide therapeutic and rehabilitative services and enhance the interpersonal and vocational skill. 99 children with disabilities avail the services on daily basis.

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Achievement

- 19 numbers of children with disability having speech problem are availing services from DCTC. Children are able to speak
- 95 CWDs availing therapeutic services
- 56 CWDs availing rehabilitative services like training on ADLs and special education. 22 have doing their ADLs without support and 34 have with support.
- DCTC have its own multidimensional activities to create a platform for CWD for their inclusive development. The Parents are getting platform to enhance their knowledge on disabilities and process of rehabilitation.
- The CWDs are availing therapeutic and rehabilitative services in a daily basis. Different types of activities has been conducted such as creative fest, inclusive sports, vocational training for social inclusion and economic rehabilitation.
- A Van has been moving named “Bhinakshyama Seva O Sahayata Express” to the villages in every Saturday. The objective of the express is to disseminate the information on DCTC, early identification of CWDs and provide therapeutic services at door step.
- 75% parents are doing exercise at home and support their child in the rehabilitative process.
- Due to awareness meeting and mobile van Services local health service provider and doctors are referring the child to the centre for therapeutic and rehabilitative services.
- 30 Children with Disabilities at Kantamal and 39 at Sonepur Centre.

BHINNAKSHYAMA SEVA O SAHAYATA EXPRESS

Children with disabilities are subject to multiple deprivations and limited opportunities in several dimensions of their lives. Their families and caregivers also go through lot of stress and challenges in having a person with disability due to unavailability of therapeutic and rehabilitation services. People living in rural India are unaware about disability and their rehabilitation mainly children with cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation, Autism and multiple disability.

To cater the need of the children with MR, CP, MD and autism RARE initiate a mobile van services named BHINNAKSHAMA SEVA O SAHAYATA EXPRESS. The objective of the initiation is

- To identify the CwDs at earliest
- To create awareness
- To create a system of Referral services
- To promote inclusiveness
- To facilitate door steep rehabilitation services
- To create a network with village service provider

Bhinnakshama Seva O Sahayata Express started its journey to serve the children with disability on 10th March 2018. Every Saturday it's reached a village and does the following activities.

Activities Undertaken

- Meeting with Aganwadi Workers, ASHA and visiting school for identification of children with disability
- Public meeting for Awareness creation
- Home visit to the families of CwDs
- Providing counseling services
- Providing Occupational and Physiotherapy services
- Providing need based referral services

Achievement

- 30 children at Kantamal and 39 children at Sonapur identified and counseled them to access the Therapeutic Intervention Centre.
- 17 villages with 17 numbers of awareness meeting could organized at Sonapur and at Kantamal 16 village covered with 8 awareness meeting.
- Home based physiotherapy and rehabilitation therapy provided to 4 children with MR and CP and counseled them to attend the Day Care Centre regularly.
- 13 parents are aware on services available in the locality and different govt. Provisions for person with disability.
- 22 persons got disability certificate with the support of Bhinnakshama Seva O Sahayata Express.

COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (Comprehensive Community Care and Reintegration of Persons with Mental Illness)

RARE has been working on Community Mental Health and Development Programme since 2008 in Subarnapur District with the Support of Basic Needs India, Bangaluru. The programme aims at improved human rights of people with mental illness, reduced stigma and discrimination in community and resource enhancement of all stakeholders. The Programme is being implemented in Birmaharajpur Block of Subarnapur District, targeting 750 Persons living with mental illness. 15 Community Volunteers are engaged in the process for identification, facilitating the process of treatment & access to entitlement; provide psychosocial education and referral services to PWMIs. On the other hand, periodical meeting have been conducted to activate the local health service provider such as ASHA, ANM and AWW on mental health to identify and provide referral services. The launching of the programme was 08.04.2022 at the Block conference Hall, Birmaharajpur in the presence of SDPO, BDO, ADPHO, District Mental Health team, BPM SDH, ABEO, President and Secretary of Sarapanch, ASHA, AWWs, Teacher, Media and Civil Society Organization were actively participated with the care taker of PWMIs.

Key Activities

- Awareness generation in the community and various stakeholders.
- Identification of PWMIs and provide referral services to PWMIs.
- Referral Services for Treatment and Medicine support.
- Follow up and psycho education to PWMIs and their family members.
- Engage to stable PWMI in small income generation activities.
- Formation and strengthening of Family Support Groups at Gram panchayat level.
- Linkages with govt. scheme and entitlements through advocacy.
- Media mobilization and district level advocacy for ensure the rights of PWMIs.
- Volunteer and Staff training on different aspect on Mental Health.
- Provide psycho- social education to PWMIs, their family member and community member and other stakeholder.
- Date collection and updation in Goonjan Software.

Achievements

- 712 persons with Mental Illness identified with the cooperation of Society
- 712 PWMI and their caregiver have been provided psychosocial education
- 487 under treatment and medicine from 310 Government and 177 at Private Hospital.
- 42 PWMI recovered and not undergoing medicine
- 165 availed Certificate
- 215 families covered under housing and old age pension
- 270 PWMIs are involved in small income generation activities like wage earning, kitchen garden, business, photography and goat & sheep rearing.
- 15 family support group have been formed and regular meeting are going on for strengthening
- 105 ASHAs and 280 AWWs, 11 ANMs are involved in Identification referrals and follow up process
- The team of District Mental Health Unit and Block Mental Health Unit reached through the sharing meeting as well a

INTERVENTION IN ADDICTION- A NEW WAY FOR GANESH

Ganesh Sahu is 22 year old of Kanpur village under Uphula GP under Birmaharajpur Block of Subarnapur. In his family they are 4 members i.e. himself, his mother and 2 brothers. His family comes in Below Poverty Line. His two brothers engaged in daily wages labour work and agriculture to maintain their basic needs. Ganesh doing study at Birmaharajpur College. At this time he addicted in Smoking and Drinking alcohol with friends which affects his study. He remained silent and spend most of the time in solitude, didn't interact with anybody and the addiction increased day by day. Seeing his odd behavior his brother Manoj Sahu took him to Sambalpur Govt Hospital. He continued medicine for 4 years then his condition improved, got cured and stopped treatment. Due to irregularity of medicine again affected because of he taken alcohol too much.



Ganesh identified as a Person with mental illness through the volunteer Parbati Chanda on date 13.04.22 under the CMHD programme implemented by Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE), supported by Basic Needs India, Bangalore. When RARE team interacted with Ganesh Sahu, found his symptoms that he doesn't sleep, doesn't do his daily work on time, violence behaviour, wandering out site, wearing dirty clothes, severely drugs addicted. Due to the violence behavior the family members not able to control him also they were not interested to keep Ganesh at home and treated him. At this time the volunteer and staff member of RARE tried their level best to mobilize for treatment and counseling. In between this period the team connected with the Drugs De-addiction Centre (DDC) of Matupali and referred Ganesh for 3 months to Sai Ashra, integrated rehabilitation centre for Addiction, Matupali under Ullunda Block. On 29-04-22 his treatment initiated at Govt. Hospital, Subarnapur within the 3 months of period. He continued medicine at the DDC and continued his ADL regularly. Day by day his symptoms decreased. In between this three month of period RARE's team visited to DDC, Matupali 3 times and found that his behaviour with ADL changed and improved. At present he stopped taking alcohol and his symptoms also decreased due to regular medication.

SEXUAL REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS

- On the observance of International women's Day 126 member were pledged against Child Marriage.
- 105 members from SHGs were aware on Adolescent Health Care, Education, Gender Based Violence, Domestic Violence, online safety and pledged against Child Marriage.
- 135 adolescent girls trained on menstrual hygiene management and they are using sanitary pad regularly.

SCREENING CAMP OF CLEFT LIP AND CLEFT PALATE:

With the support of Operation Smile, Inga Health Foundation in collaboration with Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE), 2 Screening camp was organized at Boys High School, S. Rampur and RARE Office Gokarneswarpada on 5th & 12th March, 2023. Before the screening camp the online training programme for all the staff members to be engaged for the programme. Later on the campaign van started with leaflet and poster to be pasted in different places of the District. At Rampur 5 persons and at Sonapur 6 persons were identified. Out of them 5 members were attended the surgical correction camp.

INDUCTION TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR THE WARD MEMBERS:

With the support of Zillaparisad Subarnapur and State Institute for Rural Development (SIRD), Bhubaneswar the Organization Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE), Sonapur selected as the Collaborative Partner Organization (CPO) to organize the training programme for Birmaharajpur Block of Subarnapur District. The training was based on the fundamental to Panchayati Raj System.

SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD

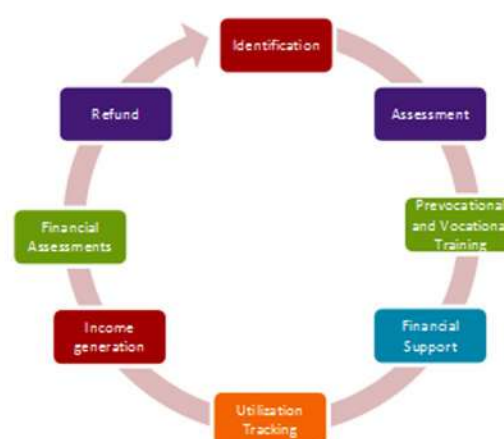

RARE has put effort to bring the Sustainable Livelihood development option among the families of Mental illness and PWDs as well as care giver of child without parental care.

Keeping the economic issues, RARE has been implemented various programmes under the livelihood themes with the support from Basic needs India, Bangalore, National Foundation of India, New Delhi, Federation of Disabled peoples and parent's organisation, Tarva and Stitching Kinderpostzegels, Netherland, aiming to empower the families with PWDs & Mental Illness to enable them to enhance their food security, increasing their incomes and improve their quality of life through financial assistance to engage in income generation activities keeping in the mind of local market, local resources, and linkages with the government schemes & programme.

Cycle of Economic Rehabilitation

Achievement:

- 33 families of children without parental Care are being provided 330000.00 with the amount they have started different farm and non farm activities and earning at an average income of 200 to 300 per day.
- 19 stabled PWMIs have provided an amount of Rs. 190000/- to start different activities and the people with mental illness with the support of their families. They are procuring medicine out of their profit.
- In collaboration with Action Aid Association 2 Mushroom shed are being running with a cost of 265000/- each. In each Mushroom cultivation cum training centre 10 single women and the parents of persons with Disabilities are being covered. In group the women started Mushroom Cultivation and providing training to other like minded women to undertake the programme.

To promote a strong consumer movement in rural and urban area of the district different activities on consumer issues was carried out by RARE with the support from Food Supplies and Consumer Welfare Department, Government of Odisha through the Assistance Controller of Legal Metrology office of District administration, Subarnapur.

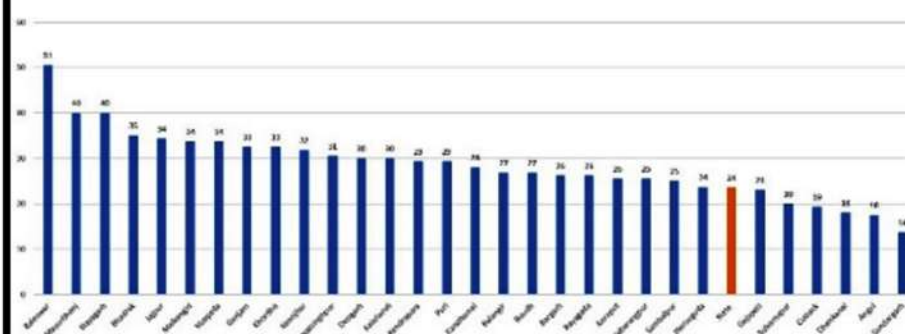

- V. Due to the regular flow of salt collection RARE must update the web data as per the agreement and it's up to date for fruitful information for donor agency and for all the VCO in Odisha for advocacy purpose.
- VI. Advocacy is the main part of this project, because RARE has initiated the programme for strengthen to Consumer about Iodine salt and it's important in the state of Odisha.
- VII. Successfully collaborate with state and district level health department to ensure the avail the standard iodized salt in the state as well as all the 30 districts of Odisha.
- VIII. Regular advocacy with National Iodine Deficiency Disorder Control Programme (NIDDP) cell at state department and follow up to priority districts where RARE found sub-standard salt as per the lab and NABL data result after testing of the salt samples.
- IX. Quarterly basis result sharing meeting has conducted by Project Coordinator and RARE team with the ADM-cum-DCPO and CDM&PHO along with Food Safety Officers for maintain the standard salt in the district and regular collect Legal Samples from the interior pocket to know the exact quality of salt and its Iodine content.
- X. Successfully conducted field visit of 10 districts where RARE found most of availability sub-standard salt and discussed with the FSOs for taking necessary action.

- On 27th May 2022, RARE attended a meeting for a brief discussion about the consumer program in Odisha through Presentation and last 1.5 years of salt testing result sharing with Ms. Mini Varghese, Country Director Nutrition International, Mr. Ranjan Kumar Jha, Senior Program Officer, Nutrition International (USI), Mr. Abhishek Mohanty, Manger Odisha, Nutrition International, Mr. Ananga Negi, General Secretary-cum-CEO, Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE).

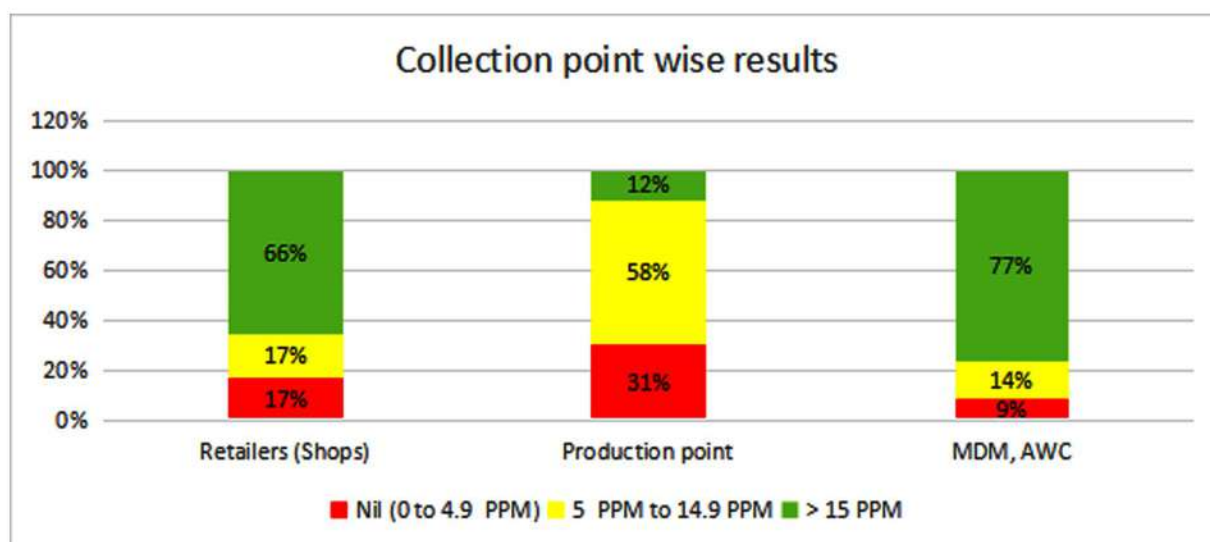
- On the same day, visited to Cuttack Malgodown for meeting with few wholesalers and discussion on the salt flow and figure out the trend of seller and buyer in Odisha, mostly know the wholesale chain of Odisha by asking to wholesaler owner. Ms. Mini Ma'am and Mr. Ranjan Sir want to know the details of Odisha salt production status and other state salt flow details as well as what are the most common non-iodized salt marketed from Cuttack.
- Last year 5 quarters' data was shared with Ms. Richa Pande for further advocacy meeting plan with RARE and the Government of Odisha. The data has been segregated into different steps like Brand, state, district, Iodine percentage levels, etc.
- On 15th June 2022, RARE has organized an online meeting with the RARE monitoring team and Mr. Abhishek Mohanty Manager NI, Odisha for a brief discussion on the upcoming advocacy process and main issues and challenges for meet with all the state department heads. 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE), for Andhra Pradesh Project has got the contract from Nutrition International (NI) for the period of August 16th, 2022 to March 31st 2023, to partner its advocacy efforts to improve regulatory monitoring to improve coverage of adequately iodized salt in the state. The activities carried out during this reporting period were as follows:

- 900 salt samples were collected from various points from retail, production and Social safety net program centre across all the 13 districts of Andhra Pradesh during the reporting period of Aug '22 to Mar '23, which was analyzed in the project laboratory through iodometric titration. A total of 703 samples were collected from retail point, out of which 66% was adequately iodized. 120 samples were collected from production point out of which 12 % were adequately iodized and 77% of the 77 samples collected from School (PM Poshan) and Anganwadi centre were adequately iodized.



- During the project period of Aug '22 to Mar '23, PC along with network partners has visited district officials of all the 13 districts of the state, these officials included viz. Joint Collector, Food Safety Officers and Inspectors of Legal metrology department officials. PC shared the districts monitoring report, list of inadequately iodized brands and strategy for improving the coverage of iodized salt in the district.

2. KEY SUCCESS FACTORS

- Successfully conducted state level AP advocacy workshop on 30th August 2022 in collaboration with Consumer Voice, New Delhi. Officials from 8 departments participated in the program and action plan for different departments were prepared and shared with respective line departments.
- In response, state level circulars were issued by the AP tribal welfare department and education department to bring awareness on iodized salt and utilize iodized salt only in public serving schemes, school and hostels across the state.
- Collection of samples by the network partners from all 13 districts.
- Strengthening existing network of civil society and consumer organizations.
- Awareness programs organized by CRA on using only the adequately Iodized salt.
- Global IDD week observation by CRA and the partners of all districts.

3. CONSTRAINTS

- ☐ There are still Govt. officials' allotments not completed especially in Food safety and Legal metrology departments.
- ☐ The Joint Collectors had been transferred to the new districts, impacting planned USI activities in the districts.
- ☐ IDD program is the low priority to the Government officials, due to very low death rate.
- ☐ Lack of effective co-ordination and synergy among various government departments to address the problem by adopting a holistic approach.
- Acute difficulty in identifying street vendors of crystal salt and their source of supply as they mostly operate in villages and semi urban areas. Also lack of support and co-operation from them in view of their genuine fear of losing their livelihoods.

Conclusion:

The programme are concluded with extending sincere thanks to the stakeholders and other dignitaries who are cooperating directly and indirectly with a request to continued support.

MOBILE MEDICARE UNIT FOR SENIOR CITIZEN

The Mobile Medicare Unit for Senior Citizens for the service of Senior Citizens is implemented by Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE) with the support of SSEPD, Govt. of Odisha and District Administration, Subarnapur. It aims to provide primary health care and counseling support to the senior citizens from unreached areas.

Preparatory activities for the programme:

Before organizing of camps a monthly plan of action plan are being submitted to DSSO, Subarnapur in consultation with Doctors to be assigned for the health care programme. 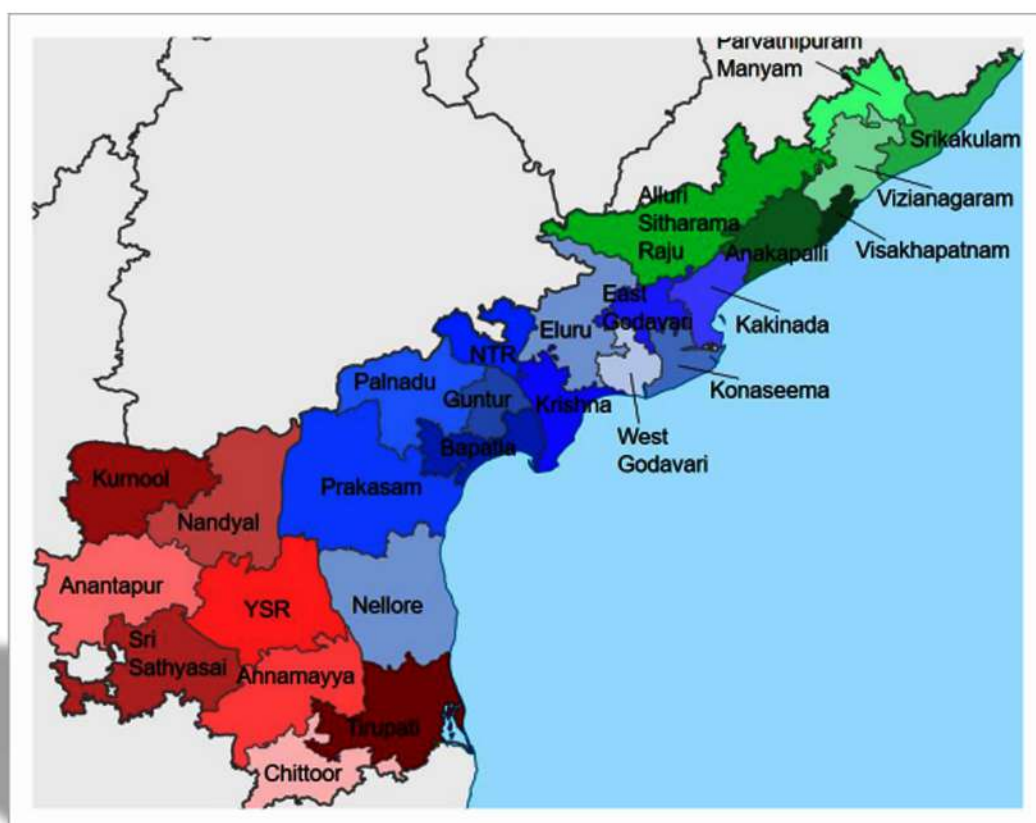

1. **SYSTEMS OF ACCOUNT**

5. **INVESTMENTS**

Investments are stated at cost.

2. Corpus fund amounting to Rs.12,08,951.00 has been utilized for the Construction of RARE own building.
3. During the year under audit asset amounting to Rs.16,58,508 has been created.
4. Capital Donation amounting to Rs.12,65,000.00 has been received during the year.
